HARLEM LACROSSE STUDENTS DISCOVER NEW POSSIBILITIES

We hosted students from Harlem Lacrosse for a "career exploration day" this July. Designed to introduce youth to the wide range of employment opportunities available at Tradepoint Atlantic and expand their awareness of the world outside of their neighborhoods, the field trip was part of Harlem Lacrosse's work to close the opportunity and achievement gaps for underserved students. In addition to career exploration trips, students engage in various activities like study halls and tutoring, lacrosse instruction and competition, enrichment experiences, college trips and secondary school advising/placement.

FEDERAL GOOD JOBS GRANT

Governor Larry Hogan joined local and federal officials here in August to announce the award of \$22.9 million in grant funding for expanded workforce training to support Maryland's growing offshore wind industry. In partnership with Tradepoint Atlantic tenants US Wind and Orsted Offshore North America, along with other leading employers and local unions, the grant will fund implementation of the **Maryland Works For Wind** program, focused on providing formerly incarcerated individuals, veterans, disconnected youth and other underserved populations with training and apprenticeship. The program intends to place and/or upskill more than 4,300 Marylanders, create more than 10,000 jobs in Maryland and yield an economic impact of nearly \$3 billion over the next 20 years in the Baltimore area and Central Maryland alone.
